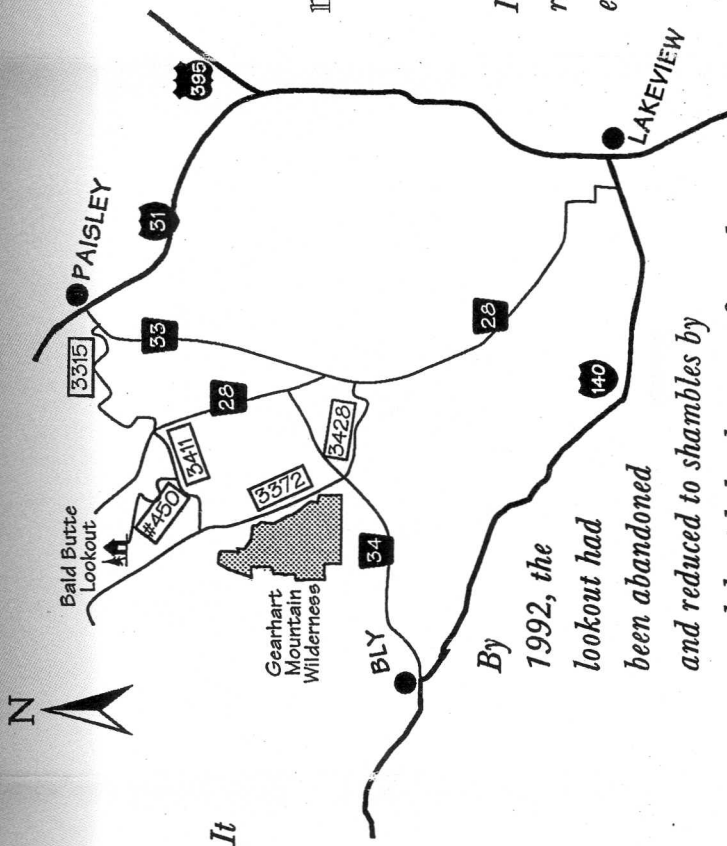
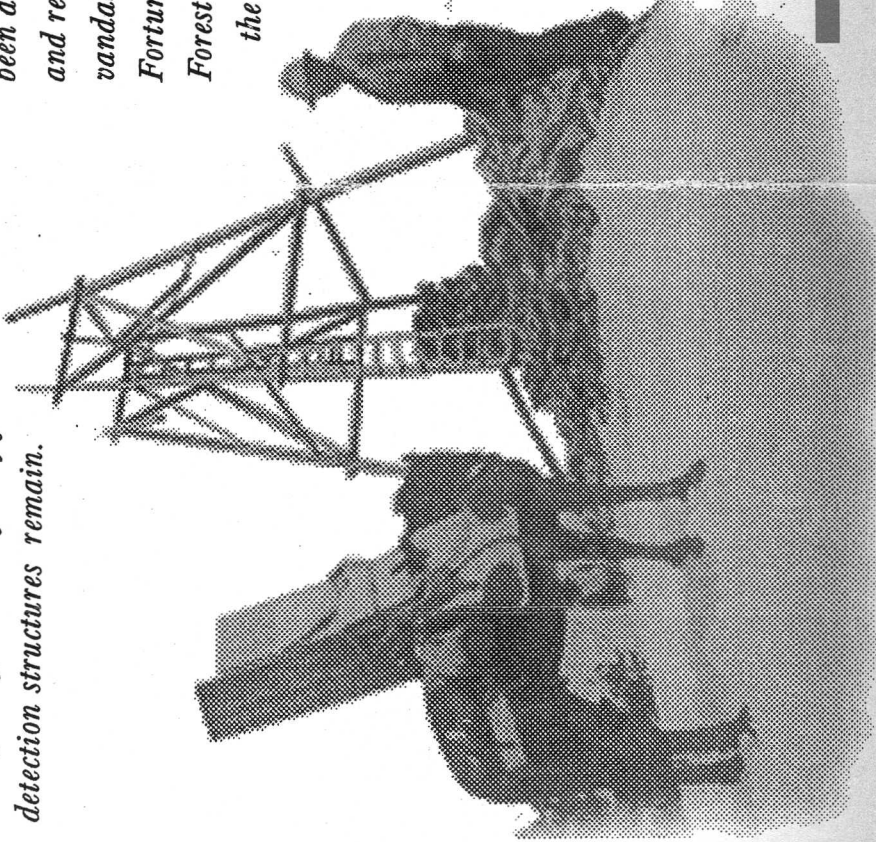
LOOKOUT RENTAL

Built in the summer of 1931, Bald Butte Lookout served as a Forest Service fire detection site for many years. It was constructed from an Aladdin L4 Lookout kit; all of the pieces were pre-cut, six feet or less in length, so the entire kit could be packed by horses into the remote site. Once hundreds of these types of lookouts were in service throughout the Pacific Northwest. Now only a few examples of this era of early fire detection structures remain.

By 1992, the lookout had been abandoned and reduced to shambles by vandals and the elements of weather. Fortunately, a number of Fremont National Forest employees took an interest in restoring the old lookout as a Passport in Time project to preserve it for the future and to provide a recreational rental opportunity for forest visitors. Forest Service employees and civilian volunteers worked together during the 1993 and 1994 summers to restore the lookout and build the furniture from original 1930's plans.
